No roads at all except linking Little Ferry-Dornoch-  
-Gmbo. Bonar Ferry is marked, but there was  
no road at all round the Firth, although a  
road ran from the Shin River at the Kyle of  
Sutherland, and up north over the hill to Loch  
Fleer, by way of Airdines, Knock Dow, Loch  
Bowie and Gaskillie. The Maenel had not yet  
been built, and the road ended at Torboll  
- there was no road to Golspie

The rents in the SE of the County were  
15/- to 21/- per boll or acre arable, and  
30/- to 35/- for accompanied pasture, with  
services to the land lord thrown in. "The  
poor who are proud suffer excruciating misery,  
to the verge of starvation" - ~~the~~ if they were  
too proud to beg, as many were, they had  
to depend on the kindness of their neigh-  
-bours. Sometimes they had help from some

1912 wealthy and humane families, but this was not organized. There were no sturdy beggars (i.e. people not crippled or infirm) and no gypsies at all. The crime of murder, rapine and plunder stopped in 1640. "Domestic and social virtues are now cultivated and revered by all ranks of people."

Flax and wheat thrive near Dornoch; at Overkibs, peaches, walnuts and apricots ripened well out of doors, and pears, apples and cherries at Dunrobin.

Tenants called wadsetters paid £200 for rent of 30-50 acres, and sublet to their own tenants for £3 - £5 plus unlimited services (wadsetter = tacksmen?). They <sup>wadsetters</sup> had leases of 19-21 years, which could be renewable, but they gave their subtenants only short leases, 3, 5 or 7 years. At the end of the 19 years lease, the wadsett money was redeemed, and the farmer became a tenant, but then he could not sub-let - his sub-tenants then made their own arrangements with the proprietor, so that they were independent of the farmer. Land was not measured by acres so much as bolls. 1 boll = approx. 1 acre of land, enough to grow 1 boll of bear ~~or~~ or barley). Arable land was measured by pennyland, farthing + octos. 1 pennyland = approx. 8 acres. 1 octo = 1 boll or acre)

There were no Parliamentary enclosures in Sutherland (i.e. none financed by loans or grants from the government). All enclosing was done by proprietors on their own land. Some of the boundary walls (dry-stone) are "extremely ancient", some recent.

Wadset : the holder of a farm gives a sum of money to the proprietor, and interest at 5% goes to the proprietor as rent, for years 1-19; after 19 years, the proprietor repays the original money, and the farmer becomes a heritable tenant, paying rent. His descendants then have some security.

The estates of Skibo, Embo, Rosehall (or Laing) and the Sutherland estates were all held of the Crown i.e. they owned no superior except the Crown. The rest were Baronies and wadsets. Anyone paying £200 p.a. rent, or more, was entitled to a vote. Some of the crofts within the Royal Burgh of Dornoch were held of the Crown.

Mr Dempster held Skibo and was an extremely enlightened landlord. His estates lay between the Firth and the Evelix river, and westward to Creich.

The Evelix river was the boundary between Skibo and the Sutherland estate, owned by the Marquis of Stafford.

Spinningdale Mill burned down in 1806

1812 It was a cotton spinning mill, employing 100 hands, with 36 jennys, 136 spindles in each. The mill hands lived in 20 tied houses (David Dale founded it). It was not rebuilt or reopened after the fire


