2. Achley . 1570 Achluay : achadh + gen. of laogh 'field of the calf' (nr. junction of Poles Rd + Evellix Rd)
3. Ach inchanter - 'Field of the Cantor or Precentor'. Bishop Gilbert's charter of 13th c. allots whole of Huetterhinche to the Precentor (= G. nachdar 'upper' + innis 'pasture'; very probably the 'Hector Common' granted to Bishop Andrew by David I, c. 1150. (on Embo road)
4. Achintreasnich - 'field of the Treasurer' - was in the w. part of Hilton of Embo
5. Achthuiche - in a decree of 1686 regarding marches (boundaries) - said to be N.E. of Proney, + said to be a marshy, misty place, thus probably G. toit 'vapour' - 'field of vapours' (I doubt this. Bm)
6. Achurach, to N. of the Burgh - G. urach 'dusty' i.e. 'the dusty field' - soil erosion? (between Poles Rd + Embo Rd)
7. Achnacaorach - adjoins Achurach. 'field of the sheep'.
8. Achanduach - site not known. Perhaps achadh nan dumhach 'field of the sand banks' Cp. Achinduich, on the l. bank of the river Shin

78. Dalreidh - 'peaceful, or level, valley place' 11
(nr ~~Skibo~~ Skibo) **National Provident Institution**

79. Ducarowon - in the Skibo policies, to the east of them. Probably a dovecote enclosure - a frequent name in old charters.

80. DORNOCH: old forms: 1136 + 1230

Durnach, 1456 Dornouch, 1568 Dornoch, 1640 Dornagh + Dornoch.

The Dorn 'fist' + 'eich' 'horse' derivation is rubbish - Battle of Embo was 13th c, and the name is older, + anyway, eich cd not give och. Dornach is OG for pebbly place, referring to fist-sized stones in the links.

81. Embo: 1223 Ethenboll, 1660 Eyndboll.

Gaelic form Enriboll (change of n to r common in Sutherland). 1606 mentions Indbol. Probably N. name Eyvindar-ból - Eyvind's stead.

82. Evelix: 1222 Avelech, Awelech, Awelek 15th c. Avelik; 16th c. Evelik, Evelich said to be G. eibhleag, a live coal, with English pl. form, reference to sparkling water of the river. Prof Watson gives this + says five names for water are quite common. (But - is this likely? If the meaning of eibhleag was understood, surely it wd have a G plural, and surely an

11. Achgormlary : 1557 Auchgormalaye, 1746
Achgormlary. Possibly achadh - gorm - lar
'field of the blue/green soil'. But there is
a ruin of a very ancient dwelling there, +
this wd. give achadh - gorm - laraigh (old gen
of laraich 'field of the green sites'. (Or a
striking name? Bm) (most w. house up Evelix river)

12. Achvandra 1525 Auchandro,
1529 Hauchandrow 'Andrew's field'. In
1510, James IV granted to Andrew Kynnard
the dues of Skelbo, which included Achvandra
(Also Bishop Andrew 1150? He got Achinchank,
not far away. Bm) (on A9, w. of road, + w. of

13. Achlusti : achadh - ~~loiste~~ loiste 'field of

29. Amail - Creag Amail, near Torkoll (nr the mound) - from G. amail 'hindrance' - this rock was the one the tides dashed against in the estuary before the mound was built. It also hindered passage to Golspie from the Dornoch side.

112 Lochantrial - uncertain; cd be triall (1) 'a try, attempt'; (2) 'a journey'. Or from triath 'chief'. (nr Camore) triabhail is 'trophy' triall, triabhail is the procession of people to a shieling (the last seems the most likely).

113. Meikle Ferry - Big Ferry, Scots English, from Norse mikill.

114 Meall a Chaorunn - Hill of the Rowan (right up the Evelix nr Ben Donuil, n. of Achvaich)

69. Cuback : 1717 Cubhack. Now Culbachie (up the Poles Rd, just n. of Achley) G. coul 'back' + N. bakki 'ridge, bank' : 'back of the ^{cut} bank'. In the 18th c, a hamlet was here + in 1738 in the Session Records Culbag produced the only possible predecessor for the church (cathedral?)
