Supporting Tourism and Hospitality



Jamie Stone MP has secured a meeting with the Treasury about getting more support for the tourism and hospitality sectors and has been working to get the current support schemes extended to support food and drink wholesalers.

He has commented, "Food and drink businesses are vital to the economy in the Highlands but have been hit hard by the pandemic. We must avoid redundancies and help bolster these businesses as the UK starts to reopen."

COVID19: A More Localised Approach?

Liberal Democrat Councillors on the Highland Council have sent a report to the Scottish Government to push for a more Central Belt - most obviously localised approach to dealing with coming out of lockdown.

They made the point that there are major differences in the Highlands compared to the things like 5 mile travel limits which are a nonsense in rural

areas - and that the risk levels are far lower in the Highlands generally.

Local risk levels need locally managed responses, not centralised conformity.

Helping Distilleries with Hand Sanitizer



After being contacted by the owner of the Dornoch distillery, Jamie Stone MP made representations to HMRC to approve a World Health Organisation (WHO) formula for hand sanitizer. Afterwards HMRC agreed to approve the formula allowing distilleries to begin production. cheaply, and quickly."

He said, "What distilleries have achieved here in Caithness, Sutherland and Easter Ross shows that if you don't ask, you don't get. They put their community first and in successfully lobbying HMRC with me, they made it easier to produce hand sanitizer safely,

Linda Munro working with the community



Linda Munro, Liberal Democrat Councillor for North, West and Central Sutherland, has been working with the local community to support those in need.

Linda said, "The first local impact of Covid was a tsunami of emails and calls from constituents who had gone up to 200 miles to get the staples of life without success.

"We are all used to travelling great distances for the essentials, but returning home without the basics is something quite different. TESCO deliveries were booked weeks in advance and the more people tried to access shopping and failed, the higher community anxiety grew.

"We set up a Coop order and delivery service, door to door. We recruited volunteers across an area of 513 square miles, successfully applied for HIE funding and were able to donate food parcels and other essentials to those in need as well as pay 45p a mile to volunteer drivers

"We were helped enormously by our east Sutherland colleagues by their generous sharing of the Fare Share food supplies, SSE were immediately in touch offering help as was Helen Houston with an abundance of help and advice on every sort of funding available to the communities.

"But the undeniably, absolute stars of the show were the communities. Hands down, no contest they nailed it and they are truly going from strength to strength."

Richard Gale keen to tackle fuel poverty

East Sutherland and Edderton Councillor Richard Gale has been working on tackling fuel poverty in the Highlands. After the devastating impact of Covid19, he feels this is more important than ever.

Commenting on this, Richard says, "Firstly I want to thank everyone in the local community for their efforts. It has been a privilege to work with a number of community groups all of whom have done great work to support their communities.


"However it is clear that the economy is going to take a big hit. Over 70% of Caithness and Sutherland residents live in fuel poverty already. That is partly due to customers in the far north having to pay higher distribution costs than the rest of the country so we face a grave situation.

"I have been working both with the Highland Council and Jamie Stone about this. Jamie Stone has launched early day motions in Parliament too and we will keep fighting on this front."
