
The Cave By Leah and Jessie

one day a young girl went into the cave and came out with a golden nugget. She was very happy when she found the gold as they had always been so very poor.


She went back to her house which was an old ramshackle hut that backed onto the beach. She fetched her father who then followed her back to the cave.

The golden dust from the holly tree reminded her of the cave.


She began feeling worried about the gold in case it fell into the wrong hands.

After their work was done the girl and her father hurried back to bed because it was dark and getting late.


In the spring the fox had eight little cubs and the starling also got a family. The nisse stayed with the girl and her father and together they made sure all the holly trees were kept safe and healthy.


For the rest of their lifetime, whenever there was a huge storm they let the animals shelter amongst the trees and the garden to keep them safe.
