To the Prison Board
of Dornock
Gentlemen

I have received from Mr Armstrong instructions to give you an estimate for improving the heating of Dornock prison -

The several prisons which I have lately heated with patent Hot water pipes have given entire satisfaction & I have no doubt I could heat equally satisfactorily the one at Dornock but I would require to begin anew, as I could not attempt to improve which I consider to be erroneous in arrangement -

The expense of heating the two

floors of the Dornock prison, which includes pipes, iron furnace, galvanized expansion Cistern & fixing pipes, exclusive of mason & wright work, will be one hundred & twenty pounds (£120) -

I could not be responsible for the apparatus already erected which I have never seen but if upon examination, it could be made available I would give you credit for it to the extent of ten pounds (£10) -

I could also heat the ground floor of the prison from the same furnace if sunk below the ground floor -

I would require to see the building before arranging the pipes, & I have kept the tracings sent me till I hear from you as I can do nothing without them -
