The Lochinver Red Cross Work Part was begun in September, 1914. A sma committee of ladies in the village was formed with representatives from the ditricts of Inverkirkaig, Torbreck, Badna ben, Strathen, Inver, Baddiedarrock Achmelvich, Brackloch, and Tumore From the scattered nature of the parish it was impossible for the workers to meet on fixed days, so was resolved that the work should be don at home, and when completed should b sent to the Reading-Room for allocation. The response has been of a very heart nature, everyone has been doing their littl bit, and well may they, for Lochinver and district has given its best blood to fight for King and country. Many have mad the supreme sacrifice, and where can pat riotism go further. The amount of worl collected and disposed of for the soldier and sailors at home and abroad has been very creditable, nor have the local boy-been forgotten. The Work Party has been fortunate in having Mrs Kerr, Assym Lodge, as their convener, who is devoting much time in carrying on the work. The secretarial duties are in the hands of Mis-Margaret N. Aird, Lochinver, who also act as hon, treasurer of the branch, and it is needless to say her work gives satisfaction.
