COMPLETION CONTRACT COST

Further to our meeting on Monday 1 March I write to confirm that the total grant which was to be paid from the Highland Regional Council, the S.E.D. and the H.I.D.B. was £44,847.00 and that £38,549.44 had been paid to date and that therefore the balance due is £6,297.56.

The Dornoch Community Association were to contribute 12¹/₂% of the total cost and therefore £6,949.00 was to be taken from funds for the contract. The total paid to date from the D.C.A. account is £6,049.00 leaving a balance of £900.00 still to come from the Association.

The balance from which payments are to be made is therefore £7,197.56.


We have already started to use up this amount in the following ways:-

2. The requirement for the installation of extract fans, dimmer switches and small electrical fittings 400.00
3. The supply of the sealer for the concrete blockwork walls and the concrete necessary for the building of the stone wall and all materials required for the landscaping and tidying up 215.51

I trust the foregoing informs you and your committee of the financial situation and look forward to receiving cheques in order that we can make payments to the contractors for the final works.

We shall continue to supervise the Youth Team who are constructing the wall and tidying up the site and hope to have the front area completely tidied up before the summer season.



TARIFF YCB FOR YWCA CENTRES

1. SCOPE OF TARIFF

Tariff for informal performances, including performances of duly-authorized recorded music, at Y.W.C.A. Centres open only to members and their friends.

2. APPLICATIONS

Applications should be made by letter to:

The Manager - General Licensing Department.

3. ANNUAL ROYALTIES

For centres where the:

Membership does not exceed 50 £4.04

For each additional 50 or part of 50 members £2.53

4. MINIMUM CHARGE

The minimum royalty under this tariff for the licence year commencing 6th April 1977 is £4.04 and the minimum annual licence charge for each subsequent year is £6.50, subject only to any adjustment provided for in clause 5.

5. COST OF LIVING

The foregoing rates of charge are related to the basic figure of 172.4 points published by the Department of Employment in the Official Index of Retail Prices for January 1977 ("basic Index figure") and are subject to adjustment in proportion to changes in that Index figure:

Provided that such adjustment shall only be made with effect from the sixth of the month following that in which the published Index figure has changed by a variation of not less than 5% on the basic Index figure as compared with -

- (a) the basic Index figure, or
- (b) subsequently, the Index figure by reference to which the last adjustment was made.

6. EXCEPTIONS

These special terms are not available to centres in respect of entertainments with music:

- (a) to which there is a charge for admission;
- (b) open to the general public;
- (c) promoted by third parties who hire the hall for the purposes of the entertainment;
- (d) provided by means of juke-boxes or other coin-operated apparatus.

For such excepted entertainments, the normal relevant tariff will be applied, and the normal complete returns of the music performed under the licence must be made.

7. VALUE ADDED TAX

All royalties calculated under this tariff are subject to an adjustment so as to include within the amount or amounts payable thereunder a sum in respect of Value Added Tax at the relevant rate.

8. GENERAL CONDITIONS

The Society is not bound to offer a licence or permit under this tariff in respect of any entertainment for which such a licence or permit is not taken out in advance.

9. COMMENCEMENT DATE

This tariff is effective from 1.4.77 and supersedes the previous tariff arrangement for YWCA centres.

Dear Bill,

I am writing to you as Scout Leader, but with the knowledge and approval of the Chairman of the General Committee, to draw to your attention a number of points of conflict which appear to be arising in contradiction to the Agreement between the Dornoch Scout Group and the Dornoch Community Association.

In this it is stated that the Scout Group shall enjoy certain facilities including (para 3) the use of the main hall on two nights per week - by tradition, Wednesday (Cubs) and Friday (Scouts). The Group in turn indicated that they did not object to the hall being used on the nights after their meetings had terminated.

On two occasions, however, within the last three months, this agreement has been breached and Scout meetings have had to be abandoned. The first was on a Friday in December 1981 when the Episcopal Church held their Childrens Xmas Party and the second was last Friday, 12th March, 1982, the night of the Top Team Quiz.

While the Scouts will co-operate whenever possible, it would be appreciated if the conditions stipulated in the agreement could be explained to those on the Hall Committee who may not be fully conversant with them. You would agree that there is nothing more likely to dampen a youngster's interest than to have his evening meeting cancelled and with 27 on the roll it is something against which we must guard.

Finally, I would propose that any deviation from our general agreement be made in writing to obviate any future misunderstanding.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN DORNOCH BOY SCOUTS AND DORNOCH COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION.

To create a clear understanding of the undertakings of the Boy Scouts and their relationship with the Community Association, the following points have been agreed.

1. That the Scout room is available for their use at any time they require at no rent.
2. That the Community Association will, on agreement with a Scout representative, let the Scout room to other bodies when not in use.
3. That the main hall be made available to the Scouts for part of two regular and specified evenings per week at no rent.
4. That the smaller upstairs meeting room be given over exclusively to the Scouts at no rent.
5. That the outside cellar be give over exclusively to the Scouts at no rent. Electric light will be installed at the cost of the Community Association.
6. That the Scouts hold one fund raising event per year to contribute what they can reasonably afford towards the overheads of the Community Association.

THE BEATRICE OIL FIELED TRUST - SUTHERLAND.

Thank you for your letter of 26th. February.

We have discussed the Association's current financial position with our treasurer and we have at present 1 float of around £400. 00. Anticipated expenditure in the next six months on overheads of insurance rates (~~£400. 00~~) etc. do not allow any use of this money for further capital projects. (~~£400. 00~~ *above*) rates etc.

While income from hire of the hall is slowly improving as use increases, it is still too early to see how this balances with expenditure. We consider it an essential part of our operation that as much as can be afforded is put forward to encourage the formation of new clubs and the expansion of existing clubs. However, discussions with our Entertainments Committee confirm that this years Festival week and associated events expect to raise around £2,000. 00 by the end of September. (1981 raised £1700. 00 and 1980 raised £1500. 00). From this money we anticipate being able to put £1,000 towards reinforcing the floor as already outlined in our previous letter. *re m/foun*

Our officers would be happy to discuss any aspects of this application at a mutually convenient time and place should this be of any assistance to you.


