


yards. As you make your way around you will admire the many fine stone buildings on the main streets and also on the smaller side streets. The beautiful library building gifted to the burgh by Andrew Carnegie is another feature of the High Street.

To the north of the library is the site of the former railway station. From 1902-1960 a branch line ran from the Mound to Dornoch carrying many visitors and provisions as well as being of immense importance to the people of nearby Embo, before the days of the motor car. Modern buildings on the site are now various craft shops, service outlets and a take-away restaurant.

Moving to the north side of the Cathedral you reach the High Street which in earlier times was the main thoroughfare of the town and where stands the Mercat Cross, a reminder of the sites of burgh fairs. Just inside the churchyard can be seen the Plaiden Ell, the stone used to measure cloth, equivalent to 1.25
