## The Sutherland Field Club.

### Secretary's Report for the year 1880.

On the 5th. of December last year, "The Sutherland Field Club" was originated. On that occasion fifteen members were enrolled, <sup>as ordinary members.</sup> Throughout the year there have been admitted, thirteen gentlemen as Ordinary Members - three as Honorary Members. - and four as Junior Members.

Of the Ordinary Members, one has removed from the county and by "Rule 3" is disqualified. One of the Junior Members has also left the county; but as, in the meantime, he has only done so temporarily, it is for the meeting to decide whether or not he be still retained in his class.

In addition to these numbers, four ladies were proposed and admitted; but, as they do not seem to have taken any interest in the Club, nor attended any of its meetings, it may be as well to leave them out. Should this be done, ~~then~~ the list of Members at the end of the first year will consist of 24 Ordinary, - 3 Honorary, - 4 Junior members: in all 34.

- "Circulation of the Blood" was also illustrated by Dr. Winchester by means of a diagram and also in the foot of a live frog and young salmon. Mr. Baxter exhibited a drawing & section of what is supposed to have been a human dwelling or sepulture which was disclosed in 1879 in one of the Nurseries. Part of an evening was also passed in viewing a number of "Microscopic Objects"

Four Excursions were also made in the course of the year. The 1st. to the Little Ferry to search for Flint Implements  
 2nd. to the heights bordering Loch Brora on the South side.  
 On this occasion a visit was paid to a "hill-fort" & to the Carrick Pictish Tower, where the President explained & illustrated by a model the construction of these ancient buildings.  
 The 3rd to the District of Loth and along the shore from Loth Station to Brora and the last to Tildonan to search for gold; but, fortunately perhaps, the finds were small in the extreme.

I must not conclude my Report without mentioning, that, a lecture on "Coal" was delivered by our worthy President.

Altogether I think the Members of the Club have reason to congratulate themselves on the growth & prosperity of the Club. Personally speaking those meetings have been a source of great pleasure and instruction; and I have no doubt that many of you in fact all of you will endorse my opinion statement.

Before retiring from office, I would make a suggestion to this effect, that, for the sake of those Members prevented by distance from attending the monthly meetings, a short report of ~~the~~ the transactions of each meeting be inserted in the local or district papers.
