1529. The master of Sutherland - son of Adam Gordon & Elizabeth Sutherland)

" In September the new Tenant of the Baronies of Skelbo, William Sutherland of Duffus entered into a bond of man rent with the Master as his over-lord, in acknowledgement of the latter consenting to receive him as Tenant & vassal in the lordship of Skelbo.

In return for the master's promise to protect him in his rights - Sutherland binds himself and his heirs to be "loyal & true to thyd, gang, and serve" the master at all times - and in every way he can - He & his heirs, if required personally, or at the castle of Skelbo, or, failing them their baileys, were to give "wyth all honor of men, leynmen, leon tennentis and seruandis" upon their own expenses and take hart the master & his heirs, in all places within the diocese of Caithness i Ross

as often as demanded - under a penalty of  
£1500 Scots.

Letter from Erich Duffus to  
William 16<sup>th</sup> Earl of Sutherland

22nd April. Abergill.

1746.

My dear Lord.

I heartily congratulate your safe return to your own house; but as far as I had not the opportunity of seeing you before I came to Cuthlaw. I was under the absolute necessity of taking the first occasion of leaving my wife home. I stirred not a step from my own door, from the day you left your country till the day I set out for Caithness so that I was not near Dunrobin in your absence. The reason whereof is of other smaller concern'd I shall communicate at meeting - which I pray God may be soon in place & quiet, which is a blessing we ought always to be thankful for. It is reported that you are immediately to return to Inverness. But the moment I hear you are settled at Dunrobin, I shall have the

as ever am, your lordships most obliged &  
faithful humble servant.

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on the 2<sup>d</sup>, September 1623 Sir Robert  
Gordon accompanied by his brother & the principal  
gentlemen of Scotland marched from Dundee  
to Killiecrankie in Strathmore the place of rendezvous.

Sir Robert formed his division into
