Ionnie VI received a charter dated 1476 of the "lands
~~renowned~~ ^{known} by the Earl of Ross, consisting of Strathconnan
Strathbran & Strathgarve - & after this the McKenzie
Barons of Tintail "held their lands independently of any

The Castle of Ellencrombie was held by the McKenzies.

Al^d above was among the Western Barons
summoned to meet James I at Inverness -
(1424) 1427 & 1428. with the result of being
beheaded or imprisoned. Some were set at
liberty. Among the latter ^{was} McKenzie of Tintail
who sent a youth - James sent him to
the High School at Perth - but John (baird)
uncles ravaged his lands while he was there
& he came home & was brought home & subdued
them.

entered into treaty with the King of England

for the subjugation of Scotland, on condition,

in the event of success, that the whole of

Scotland north of the Firth of Forth, would be

divided between them, Alex^d McKenzie stood

firm in the interests of the ruling monarch

& with such success that nothing came of this

extraordinary compact. He soon after found

him rewarded by a charter in his favour.

Dated 7th Jan 1463, confirming him in his

lands of Kintail, with a further grant of

the 5 mark lands of Killin, the lands of

Gairne & the 2 mark lands of Corpvalzie with

the 3 mark lands of Kintallichmart (etc etc)

to be holden of the said John & his successors

On 1476 the S. of Dun was forced to resign
the whole of the Earldom of Dun. allowed to
keep the lordship of the Isles.

Charles became King he was released & his

who was in Paris, when his wife burnt her
Rorahan seat because he saw the Earl making
love to another female there.

He was succeeded by his son Kenneth 4th Earl of S.
& 5th Lord McKenzie of Kintail. He went to France
with James - was present at the battle of Inverlochy with
him returned to Scotland after the Boyne
& made his peace with the Government. He was
imprisoned in Edinburgh Castle for about 1 year
but after 2 escapes liberated after "giving
satisfactory security for his peaceable behaviour"
He married Lady Frances Herbert a Poetess
Died 1701.

Monument to Liut Col Alexander Sutherland in
Kogart Church yard.

Curious square monument with w point and a stone ball on top. with two inscriptions, one in Gaelic and one ,on the opposite side in English. This says :-

This simple tomb covers the remains of Lieutenant Colonel Alexander Sutherland, who when living was a faithful in discharging the duties of this life. He was affectionate to his relations, kind to the poor and loyal to his King & Country. He lived to do good and died regretted by all who knew him. He died at Baegrudy in this parish, the residence of his ancestors, on May 22nd 1822 in the 79th year of his age.

This tribute to his memory was erected by his nephew, Captain Hugh Alexander Sutherland of Pitfuir.

Alexander Sutherland, one of two brothers, both in the Army, they held the Wadset of Baegrudy, which I believe was bought up--- or paid off--- by the Dchss Cntss. So presumably they held it afterwards under lease. Alexdr Sutherland was Aide-de-Camp to General Clinton in the American War. He left two illegitimate daughters, and Major G. was one of his executors, he left about £3000, not bad for those days. The estate was a long time being settled up and the other Executor was Captain MacKay, Torboll, who threw it up in the end,

" as evidence of the high veneration in which St Donan
was formerly held here, there was a large hollow
stone situated about 3 miles from the Church
wh: was called Luigh Donan by some, & Cathais
Donan by others i.e. St D's seat or resting place.
The tradition is that the Saint sat down in it to
rest himself when passing through the Strath of
Kildonan. The stone had a cavity so very capacious
as to hold any person in front of it, who, through

fatigue, or curiosity, chose to sit down in it.

But an ig. fellow from the coast of S. wishing to display his muscular strength & lifting it, let it fall from his hands with such force, that it was dashed to pieces. There are some old people still alive, who have seen it entire & ten incumbrances was shown a ~~precious~~ relic fragment of it as a precious relic.
