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THE CLACKMARS  
Sir Archibald Mackay possessed the lands of Durris,  
Achness & several other parts of Strathmellar, Cluny  
without written titles.

#### Sorcery & Mackays

Donald D: of Scourie d. 1616 - eldest son of Iye Mackay  
of Fearn, by his 1<sup>st</sup> wife daughter of Hugh Macleod of  
Assynt was born 1550. he m: Euphemia D: of  
Hugh Munro of Assynt in Ross. two lines of the clan of Mackay  
Hugh Mackay: Donald succeeded his father & had 5  
sons - the 3<sup>rd</sup> son Hugh - called the great general

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Lord Reay - Huncly - when he retired to Tongue  
but his Mackays in danger - for he had been proclaimed  
a traitor by law commissioners - he was 15 months at Tongue.  
The King. (Charles I) recalled Lord Reay from Pomeroy  
& he landed in England in the spring of 1644. He remained  
for sometime at Oxford with the King, who sent him to  
command the ~~army~~ in Scotland. Lord Reay was in N-Castle  
& was taken prisoner there; sent to Edinburgh & imprisoned  
there. [He was freed by Montrose. (Reay p. 369)]

House & Clan Brabazon -

P. 312 Nov. 1644. The S. & S: sent to demand the rents of  
 the land <sup>of</sup> Stationmair belonging to the clan Brabazon  
 (which were sold to him by Lord Reay). This having  
 been refused S: sent a strong party who drove  
 all the clan Brabazon's cattle - - led by Neil  
 the clan Brabazon pursued the S: & recovered  
 their cattle - taking some spoil out of Sutherland  
 - this gave rise to a new quarrel between  
 Reay & S:

After the King had surrendered to the Scots  
 Sir Robert Gordon started a fresh upstart  
 against Lord Reay - ~~X~~

P. 313 the 3d Lord S: went to Edinburgh & summoned  
 Lord Reay to appear on 4 counts. See Gordon  
 in Gen: History of Sutherland

A settlement was made with the S. & S.  
 3d Lord Reay went back to Denmark -  
 where he was in good odour with the King  
 who made him "Gouverneur of Bergen"  
 & colonel of a regiment, both of which he  
 retained till his death -

P. 323. Lord Reay died February 1649 - His body  
 was brought back & he was buried at Kirkwall

P. 341 / Fortune after losing too much time

Sir E. of Seaforth had some claims against Neil Meliod - 1670 he was prosecuted for an

alleged riot & defacement committed in front  
troops sent to smarten up him (for his  
deficiency in the taxation) 10<sup>th</sup> Feb 1670 P.C.R.

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1674 he was hanged for High Treason.

By accounts still current Meliod was  
unjustly used & deprived of his lands, the  
castle was demolished (?) & the sole house  
of Upper Ardtint was burnt. It is said the  
religion body burnt it intentionally

George 2<sup>nd</sup> King Reg. 1683 — 1702

Rev: John Mackay of Sceig was a son of
