 1180-1222. He said - Laird Beaup's family derived their
 origin from Ireland in the 12th century. --- the Danes
 being drove the Danes from these parts. He
 quotes Torquatus as saying that was the lion
 with a strong arm from the Hebrides & the
 N. W. of Scotland. including a considerable
 body from Ireland defeated Harald F. of
 Orkney, subdued all Caithness & severely
 humbled the inhabitants for the murder of
 Bishop John. This battle fought on the
 hill of CLARDON. outside Thurso. Sir T. Sinclair
 of Ulster, built a tower on the hill to commemorate
 the event.

of in the case of *Hild v Sandlaw* 9 June 1801
where it seemed to be the opinion of the
Court, that such an exception was good even
against an onerous indorsee. These circum-
stances of which we have now taken notice
form the principal exceptions to the ex-
traordinary privileges of onerous indorsees.

To enjoy these extraordinary privileges
the Indorsee must set forth or qualify
the following circumstances. 1. He must
be indorsee to an accepted, and not an
unaccepted bill. For to take an unaccept-
ed as cash, is what no one would do,
and therefore there is no hardship in this
rule. Suppose then that John draws
a bill upon James, and indorses it un-
accepted to Thomas, but that James refuses
to accept because he has no other value
of John's than what arises from a
smuggling contract. Now here the
iniquity of Apegne, Thomas may pursue
James for the value of John, which he
has in his hands, yet his claim will be
equally liable to all exceptions, as one made
by John himself would have been. 2. The
indorsee must be an onerous indorsee
and not an gratuitous, confidential, or collusive
Indorsee only. It is very true however that
the presumption of law is in his favour,
and that he is what he appears to be

J. Roy Naikay, brother of John Baikay who fought the battle of Aldy Charnish, was succeeded by his son John who married his daughter g - o. Bedlam - of Lewis. This marriage was not in conformity with common law. & J. Roy obtained from James IV a patent of legitimization for his two surviving sons. (date 1511). In spite of this royal decree much trouble was created for the descendants of J. Roy. By the efforts of unscrupulous aspirants for the Naikay land who endeavored to possess themselves of the lands of the Baikays under pretence that John & Donald Baikay were illegitimate (Sir Robert Gordon says that John Baikay made 6 incursions into Sutherland between 1517 & 1522. See his score, but says John Baikay did fight at Torravon - (captured by tradition strong) but his opponents were the Rosses, & Balnagown, the Turnbulls & the Gunnis. while with them were the Malibsons; the Pollocks).

John Baikay led the Baikays at the battle of Torravon - when the Baikays & their allies were defeated. There was much fighting in Sutherland during these years, but John Baikay signed a bond of friendship with the Macleods of Sutherland in 1522 - He died in 1529 & was s. by his brother Donald. Donald renewed the bond of friendship made with the S. & S. made by his father Iye by this brother, Donald accompanied King James on his voyage round Scotland in 1539 -

He left a son Iye Dhu 2 years:

He had remained in England for some time & took part in the capture of Haddington in the Spring of 1540. (See Gordon - p. 130.) for this he was - 14 years later - granted a commission by Queen Mary.

On the Death of his father in 1550. He returned to Scotland - but the opponents of the Earl of Huntly & Sutherland, succeeded in getting the Lord Dhu: R. Delaw illegitimate & in total in spite of the support obtained by his father by Reg. His lands were bestowed on Bishop Reid. Iye Dhu was disinherited -

1552. 1. He was called to appear before the Queen Dowager & Regent Mary at Inverness - but he refused to appear - so Sutherland obtained a commission to apprehend him. et etc. Royal Decree?

Donald at length taken prisoner & confined in Dunbar Castle where he lay till Feb 1/55

1565 Iye Dhu's lands were bestowed on Darnley & after his death in 1567 on Huntly, at the same period Huntly's sister married Bolingbroke - Lady Jane Gordon afterwards married Alexander Ruth.

Mackay raided Sutherland - & joined in the raid in December 1540. Huntly afterwards sold his lands of Strath: for 3000 crowns to Iye Dhu -

" After the death of Alexander, young
Hector - ^{his brother William} afterwards of Bishorse - became ward of

him pliant enough exiled him to Girnigoe & then
had him sent to Dealt. Then John Beg the half
- brother of Hector, took up the reins in Strathnaver
but he also proved unsatisfactory in the eyes of
the Earl of Girnigoe & he instigated the Abesachs to
attack him ---- This the Abesachs & the
Bachodays Ascent did at Balnakeil in
Durness in 1549, killing John Beg, William
Gunn brother of the Christian, the Robour
Gunn & many others. ---

On the fall of John Beg. Hector Du in his
18th year picked up the reins of the unruly team
himself.

Iye Dew died 1542. (2 years after ten barony of Donwes)
 he left 2 sons by his first marriage - with his widow -
 who were deemed illeg: & his lands went to Cristian Du

 brought up by his F. & C. who became his wades -

He got permission from Charles I to raise a regiment for the assistance of Count Mansfeld. They went abroad & saw much heavy fighting - in 12 months of the 3,600 who had embarked in Oct. 1636, only 300 were left. For his valuable services to the Danes they in the German war - he was created Lord Regy. But his various expeditions abroad cost vast sums of money which were never repaid to him the Duke of Ch: I - was buried in Newcastle - & finally died in Copenhagen in the spring of 1649. Buried at Trondheim.

The expenses of raising this regiment & others
 & other legal expenses over a ^{distressed} marriage
 wrecked his fortune. He was created Lord Ray
 for his assistance to the Danish in the German
 war. He died at Copenhagen - 1649
 & was succeeded by his son John 2nd Lord Ray.

A Royalist, he was imprisoned in
 Flanders - the States-General was accused
 of the Salt of Sutherland, who complained
 of the incursions of the Dutch, the remain-
 ing 'scoria' may still be seen about
 100 yards below the burn of Romsdall. (salt)
 He was heavily in debt & condemned to
 remain in prison till his enemies —
