My interest in Military Badges connected with the name Sutherland started in about 1996 when visiting an antiques centre in Breedon on the Hill in Derbyshire. I came across what was obviously a cap badge representing the Sutherland Crest. The stall owner did not know what it was, and so I duly bought it for the princely sum of £2.00.

When I returned to work, the badge was shown to the Curator of Military History at the Castle Museum, York, which was my place of employement at the time. He eventually identified it as the 4/5th Battalion, The Seaforth Highlanders T.A. (The Caithness & Sutherland Volunteers). This started my interest.

#### Regiments

In my search, I found that only five regiments wore badges that had anything to do with our name, and they were as follows:

(1881-Present Day)

(1908-1946?)

- a) 93rd Regiment of Foot, The Sutherland Highlanders (1799-1881)
- b) The Argyll & Sutherland Highlanders
- c) The Seaforth Highlanders (4/5th Battalion)

d) The Argyll & Sutherland Highlanders of Canada

e) The 41st Battalion (The Byron Regiment) Australian Army

Of course if anyone knows of further Regiments or units that are linked to us, I would be pleased to hear from them. I am always willing to add to what is already known.

#### 93rd SUTHERLAND HIGHLANDERS

Although the regiment dates from 1799, its history in Sutherland could be traced to the old "Sutherland Fencibles" who were disbanded for the third time in April 1799, and paid up to the 22nd of that month. Shorltly after that date, a letter was recieved, dated the 16th April from the War Office, requiring the Colonel of the "Sutherland Fencibles" to raise a Regiment of Infantry from the Fencibles, and other recruits from that County, and to be ready for inspection within three months of the letter. This was done as would have been under the old "Clan System" A census was taken of every parish, and a quota was decided by the chief's representative. Then Major General Wemyss went along with a large snuff box, and a supply of whisky. To every man whom he wished to enter the regiment, he offered the snuff and whisky, and the clerk took the mans name. When the time came for the regiment to be formed in Inverness in August 1800, not one man was missing. This was the last Regiment of the British Army thus raised, and can therefore be classed as the last true Clan Regiment. It was also the first regiment in the British Army to have its own Padre. When serving in South Africa, each man in the Regiment paid towards the stipend of a Minister. It was also unique in having very few breaches of discipline, Courts Martial, or floggings being virtually unheard of in the Regiment.

#### **Badges**

#### 93rd Regiment of Foot, The Sutherland Highlanders

1837-1845 Officers Feathered Bonnet: Within a wreath of Thistles a circlet inscribed "SUTHERLAND HIGHLANDERS" and surmounted by a crown. In the centre the numerals 93. Below the wreath a scroll inscribed "CAPE OF GOOD HOPE" Frosted silver disc.

Another badge similar to that above is described with the circlet in silver, the remainder in gilt.

1837-1856 Other Ranks

A wreath of Thistles surmounted by a Victorian Crown. In the centre, a circlet inscribed "SUTHERLAND HIGHLANDERS" and in the centre the numerals 93. a scroll at the base inscribed "CAPE OF GOOD HOPE". All in brass

1856-1881 Other Ranks Design similar to that described above but two scrolls at the base; the first inscribed "CAPE OF GOOD HOPE", the second "BALACLAVA"

No Date but obviously prior to 1881 A complete wreath of Thistles. On this a strap inscribed "SUTHERLAND HIGHLANDERS" in the centre the numerals 93. All in brass.

During the Crimean War authorization was given for the Officers of Highland Regiments to wear on their Shako's or Forage Caps an embroidered Thistle with the regimental number in the lower part, instead of just the regimental number.

In 1881 the 93rd Regiment of Foot, the Sutherland Highlanders were amalgamate with the 91st Regiment of Foot, Princess Loiuse's Argyll Highlanders to form the "Sutherland & Argyll Highlanders. I have been told that this was because the Sutherland's were a kilted regiment, whereas the Argyll's wore the trews. Two years later, the Argyll's claimed precedence, being the 91st, and the name of the regiment became "The Argyll & Sutherland Highlanders" the name that the regiment still bears today. The first battalion was called the 91st, and the 93rd, and it continued as such until after WW11.

### **ARGYLL & SUTHERLAND HIGHLANDERS**

#### 1882 (Officers Solar Topee)

A wreath of thistles mounted on a star, surmounted by a Victorian Crown, within the wreath a circle inscribed **Argy!! and Sutherland**. Within the circle, the double cypher of H.R.H. the Princess Louise. To the left of the cypher, the Boar's Head; to the right, the Cat. Above the cypher and on the circle, the Coronet of the Princess. Silver Plate with a gilt crown.

For Highland head-dress and white helmet

A Thistle wreath: within the wreath a circle inscribed *ArgyII and Sutherland*. Within the circle the double cypher of H.R.H. the Princess Louise. To the left of the cypher the Boars Head; to the right The Cat. Above the Cypher, and on the circle, the Coronet of the Princess. In silver

### Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders 3rd Volunteer Battalion

As described above, but at the base a scroll inscribed 3rd Volunteer Battn

The battalion was formed in 1881, and had its origins in the Fifeshire Regiment of the North British Militia, which was raised in 1797. It were subsequently named the Stirling, Dumbarton, Clackmanan and Kinross Militia in 1803, and finally changed to the Highland Borderers Light Infantry in 1884. It was finally disbanded in 1967

### Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders 7th Volunteer Battalion

As described above, but at the base a scroll inscribed V11 Volunteer Battln

Originally raised in 1853 in the Volunteer Force, and transferred to the Territorial Force in 1908, the battalion was raised in Stirling and Clackmanan. It saw service in both World Wars, and was disbanded in 1967 1860 1st Admin Bn of Stirlingshire R.Vs formed at Stirling 1880 Bn consolidated as the 1st Stirlingshire R.V.C.

1887 Redesignated 7th (Clackmananshire and Kinross) V.B. Argyll & Sutherland Highlanders

## Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders 8th (Argyllshire) Battalion

As described above, but at the base, a scroll inscribed *8th A&SH*. In white metal. This badge was in use by the Territorial Forces between 1908 and 1920

## **MILITARY BADGES OF THE SUTHERLAND'S**

### Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, Dumbartonshire Volunteers

Within a wreath of thistles a circle inscribed *DUMBARTONSHIRE* VOLUNTEERS and in the middle the Coat of Arms of Dumbartonshire. In Brass

- 1860 1st Admin Bn of Dumbartonshire R.Vs formed at Balloch
- 1880 Bn consolidated as the 1st Dumbartonshire R.V.C.
- 1881 Became a volunteer bn of the Argyll & Sutherland Highlanders
- 1908 Became the 9th (Dumbartonshire) Bn (TF). H.Q. Helensburgh
- 1938 Transferred to the Royal Artillery

The above four badges, I assumed were issued in the First World War, but I have been in touch with the Regimental Museum at Stirling Castle, and at the present moment they cannot date these badges for me, but they think that it was proir to the First World War. I did not realise that prior to 1914, the Regiment had so many Battalions. It could be that they were all of the Territorial Force 1908-1920, as in the 8th Battalion.

### THE SEAFORTH HIGHLANDERS

1st Sutherland Highland Rifle Volunteers 1880-1908 Other Ranks (Glengarry Badge)

Within a strap inscribed Sans Peur a cat-a-mountain. in white metal.

This badge was worn as the 5th Battalion Territorial Force from 1908 until 1920. Which, I suspect means that both badges (within the Strap/within the circlet) were worn by this battalion during the First World War

### 4th (Duchess Harriet's) Coy (Rogart) Sutherland Rifle Volunteers

Officers Pouch Belt Badge: Within a wreath of Thistles, a strap inscribed *Duchess Harriet's Company* (*Rogart*)., Surmounted by a Victorian Crown, and in the centre the Duchess's Coat of Arms

### 5th (The Sutherland and Caithness Highland) Battalion T.A.

The Officers of this Battalion were unique within the British Army, as their rank could be discerned by their hat badge.

Subaltern: Within a strap inscribed **Sans Peur** a cat-a-mountain, with one silver feather behind the strap Captain: as above but with two silver feathers Field Officer: as above but with three silver feathers Full Colonel: as above but with four silver feathers

within my collection, I have a solid badge, as of 2 above. I have been told that this badge would have been made locally during service in India, but this has still to be verified. Having corresponded with the curator of the "Highlanders" museum, which is housed in Fort George, I have been informed that the 5th Battalion, being a "Territorial" Battalion, never served in India, therefore the origin of this badge is still a mystery.

The battalion was disbanded after the Second World War, but the Sutherland Cadets used the badge until about 1975, and it is probable that this is where the anodised badge originated from.

## Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders of Canada

A strap inscribed *Argyll and Sutherland Canada*. The strap surrounded by Thistles and surmounted by a crown in the centre a cats head. at the bottom on the left a scroll inscribed *Albainn*. At the bottom on the right a scroll inscribed *Gu-Brath* 

The Regiment was gazetted in 1903, as the 91st Regiment Canadian Highlanders. In June 1905, by Royal Warrant, it became affiliated with the Argyll & Sutherland Highlanders adopting, except for the cap badge, the full highland dress of its parent Regiment. The Regiment acted as a recruiting depot during the First World War, providing men for service in the 16th. 19th, 36th, 58th, 76th, 86th, 92nd, 120th, 173rd Highlanders and the 205th numbered battalions of the Canadian Expiditionary Force. The Regiment perpetuates the 19th and 173rd



#### 9th (Glasgow Highland) Battalion

Across the top of the wreath a two-part scroll inscribed *Glasgow Highlanders* and a similar scroll at the base inscribed *9th Batt H.L.I.* with, between the two parts, the Sphinx on a blank tablet (Fig. 1751). In white-metal; also in silver-plate. Both types are found with the alternative spelling of *lacessit* and *lacesset*.
- (2) Similar to above but with longer scrolls, the top one inscribed *The Glasgow Highlanders* and the bottom *9th Bn H.L.I.* (Fig. 1752). For officers: St. Andrew and Cross and the title-scrolls in silver, remainder in gilt.

#### Princess Louise's (Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders)

#### 8th (Argyllshire) Battalion

A circlet inscribed Argyll and Sutherland. Within the circlet the letter L, the cypher of the late Princess Louise, interlaced and reversed. Within the circlet and on the left of the cypher the Boar's Head and on the right of the Cypher the Cat. Above the cypher the Princess's coronet, the whole within a wreath of thistles. At the base, a scroll inscribed 8th A  $\mathcal{C}$  SH. In whitemetal (Fig. 1759).
