Soldiers in the vicinity of a Band, or in a building, will invariably come to attention when "God Save the King" is played.

They are not to appear out of barracks without being properly dressed, and clean in all respects and carrying canes of regimental pattern.

Non-Commissioned Officers and men are not to rise from their seats in Church when the service is over, until the Minister has left the pulpit; they will then leave the Church, commencing from the front rows of seats.

## SECTION XXII.

OFFICERS' DRESS.

Review Order.—Helmet, spike and chain worn up, except by Mounted Officers when mounted.

Doublet, belts, lines and sword, tartan trews and Wellington boots, black kid gloves. For Mounted Officers patent leather jack boots, steel spurs and breeches.

Horse furniture.

White kid gloves to be worn at balls and black kid gloves to be worn at levées.

Garrison Duties-Cold Weather-General Court-Martials in Review Order. - D. C. Ms .-White helmet without lines, serge clothing, Sam Brown belt and sword, gloves and cane, trews and Wellington boots.

Garrison Boards .- Same as for D. C. M.

Hot Weather - G. C. M. - White Review Order.

D. C. M. and Garrison Boards khaki and putties, Sam Brown belt and sword, whistlecord.

Mounted Officers as above, except when they ride to the particular duty.

Horse furniture.

Regimental Duties-Cold Weather-Khaki helmet, serge coat, Sam Brown belt without sword, whistle cord, trews and lace boots, Regulation pattern.

Hot Weather .- Khaki and putties, Sam Brown belt without sword, whistle cord.

Mounted Officers as above, jack boots in cold weather. But mounted officers will always wear the frog on their Sam Brown belts, spurs will not be worn in khaki.

Horse furniture.

Drill Order. - Same as Regimental Duties.

F.S. Marching Order. - Khaki and putties, havresack with both straps under the Sam Brown belt; water-bottle, both straps under Sam Brown belt; Sam Brown belt, revolver on right side, the carrying of revolver is optional with Dismounted Officers; pouch on left; field glasses either on belt on the right front or slung over the right shoulder; rifle or carbine firing Government ammunition.

Mounted Officers. - Sword in frog on near side of saddle; field glasses on off side; British warm coat, rolled and strapped in khaki valise on pommel of saddle with three brown leather straps.

## MESS.

Cold Weather - Mess jacket, collar fastened with loop, black waistcoat showing three studs, tartan trews, Wellington patent leather boots, round silver studs (not too large). No watch chain. Plain all round shirt collar showing about a quarter inch, and black satin necktie, white kid gloves to be worn at dances. Trews must be braced up, so as to hide any shirt between trews and Mess jacket, when an Officer leans forward.

Hot Weather .- White Mess jacket, collar fastening round neck, no shirt collar, black shoulder straps, Douglas tartan cummerbund folded to 6 inches in width, patent leather Wellington boots.

Note.—Black leather foot-straps to be always worn with trews.

Regimental pattern lace-boot has a plain toe cap with two parallel lines of sewing about 16 inch apart, lace flaps outside. Patent Jack boots may have leather feet.

Plated spurs to be worn at Mess.

Whistle cord to be tied with four turns in a hangman's knot, the knot to hang level with the second button from the neck.

Lines are to be adjusted so that the loop just clears the top edge of cross belt in front, and to hang not lower than the waist-belt behind.

Cross Belt.—Pouch in centre of back, silver star badge in centre of body in front, battle badge, showing one inch of belt clear between its top edge and the edge of the shoulder strap; whistle the same distance from central badge as the battle badge. Chain to hang about 3 inches below belt.

Canes and sword knots .- Officers, except when on parade, will always carry a cane of Regimental pattern, sword knots of the round pattern to be worn short on the sword-hilt, puggaries folded the same as the men's but the badge on the puggarie in front.

Forage Caps .- The round cap is abolished in India till further orders, the glengarry will be worn by Officers with a silver badge and flash, and silk binding. The new round forage cap is not to be worn.

Medals.—Miniature Medals are always to be worn at Mess. The large Medal to be worn clear of the left edge of cross belt. Officers are recommended to get all their hot weather garments in India; helmet, glengarry and Sam Brown belt and other belts from Hawkes. Flight, Winchester, is recognised as the Regimental tailor.

## SECTION XXIII.

DRESS.

Marching Order.—Non-Commissioned Officers and men will wear braces and two pouches. Cape rolled (length 15 inches) and attached to waist belt, Mess tin strapped on top of cape with edge of buckle in line with outer edge of Mess tin and spare end of Mess tin strap coiled up through the runner, great-coat folded 15 inches by 9 inches, and attached to the brass D's on the braces by the great-coat straps. The braces should be so adjusted to the waist-belt, that the D's are one inch from the rear edge of the frock shoulder strap. The havresack to be rolled and slung over the right shoulders underneath the braces and
