Memorandum of interview with Captain Wood at Grantown on 11th May 1913.

PEATS

Yes.

The Peat cutting hitherto was left in the hands of Campbell: it has been unsatisfactory: Captain Wood suggests that I advertise for Tenders for the cutting of 1500 yards - presumably this means cubic yards. A man John Brown formerly cut the peats, - a good enough man at the work: keep him in view in accepting tenders. Hitherto 1000 yards was to be cut and last year this quantity cost £17: 10/-. The cutting includes turning, carting and stacking. Mowat to be responsible for seeing that the work is truly done. The Contractor to provide all necessary tools.

Advertise also for the hay cutting: about 10 acres Jen Ha to be cut, made and stacked: the Gillies to help in stacking but Contractor to do thatching and provide all tools. Evander Mackay usually does the hay: keep him in view. From two or three pounds in Mr J. B. Taylor's time the hay cutting has risen to 10 guineas! Mowat responsible that the work be truly done just as in the case of the peats.

HEADKEEPER

Captain Wood desires me to undertake management of Badanloch for him on similar lines to Salzcraggie: New Keeper not to have the same "rope" or responsibility as the Peter Mowat appointed Head Keeper. Old Keeper. following is a memo: of terms and conditions:-

Wages £65 a year paid quarterly, a suit of clothes and vermine money. He can keep 6 cows and 2 Heifer calves so that they can take the place of cows going out of milk: all other calves to be disposed of as calves. Four of the cows always to be in milk in July, August, September, and October, for the use of heard feel that the Lodge. The Lodge will pay for all milk consumed. Out-run of grass for hay given, but Keeper to pay all he will need the expenses in connection with the cutting, making and stacking of hay. He is to provide lodging for any tradesmen who come to do work at Badanloch. He receives 2/- a week for each dog fed, but nothing for puppies till they are 2 months old. Takes charge of Captain Wood's property generally and is responsible for all pipes and outbuildings apart from the Lodge. His wife receives £10 a year for looking after the Lodge while the family are absent. (Captain Wood has subsequently instructed J.S., to inform Mowat that he and not his wife is to be regarded as the Caretaker of the house. This in order to avoid N.H. Insurance responsibilities). Right to cut peats at his own expense. Responsibility extends to boats and boathouses and all sanitary and water pipes.

> The Headkeeper's wages are met half by the Duke and half by Captain Wood , but Captain Wood pays Mowat in full and settles up with the Estate Office subsequently.

GILLIES

In engaging the Gillies in the Autumn it is well for the Keeper to bargain with them for the Heather-burning of the following Spring. Should not fail to implement their obligation they need not be taken on again as Gillies. Gillies receive 3/4d. a day. If heatherburning cannot be done a man engaged can go into the garden and turn it over or to any other work such as the dressing of foot-paths &c. The Heads, Tom Munro, and David Sinclair receive 3/6 a day. Captain Wood recommends the employment of any boys that can be secured around Kinbrace for the heatherburning. He disapproves of up-standing pay.

Captain Wood desires to continue, the Gillies at the end of the season.

GROUSE DRAINS. Captain Wood had arranged for 1000 chains to be cut

by Donald Mackay, Bighouse, before the 15th of April 1913, but none have been cut. Put to Wowat the question if he would still like them cut this year or not. If so instruct him to have it done according to his own views. Possibly, however, he will wish this matter postponed on account of the nesting season being on. The Beat upon which drains badly needed is Black-point. Probably he may see his way to have them cut in June or July and if so he can order up to 1000 chains. BULL

Captain Wood stipulates that no bull is to be kept at Badanloch. Campbell, the retiring keeper, always kept a Herd and it is to be presumed that Mowat will likewise find it necessary to do so. Discuss this with him.

PONIES.

There are 5 or 6 hill ponies. Mowat has to see to Ponies and the 2 floats and also to the heavy cart. He will meet me at Kinbrace Station any time I have to go there.

MILK & EGGS

Headkeeper to supply milk and eggs. These supplies used to amount to about £45. Ask Mowat about price of milk. Campbell charged at the rather high rate of 1/4d per gallon.

COWS

Should Mowat find it inconvenient to pay down all the money needed for the purchase of the cows Captain Wood authorises me to advance him from £80 to £100. This money he can pay up as he finds it convenient, or by the milk and egg bill. But cows must calve to suit Captain Wood's requirements. If any should fail they must be sold and others procured.

THE DAM. .

Mowat is to lock after Badanloch Dame. He takes his orders from Factor Morrison. Mr Sykes will go up and explain as to the working of the Dame to Mowat. Campbell has all the papers connected with the Dame and will doubtless also explain to Mowat.

CARTING.

All To carting for Captain Wood, the Underkeepers are supposed to do under Head Keeper's instructions, but now any carting for Contractors. Stores are to be sent up for the Lodge a third time in advance of the arrival of the family.

It has been the custom that certain duties in connection with the carting and the ponies have been delegated to the second keeper and certain others to the third keeper,

This arrangement may be continued as far as possible, but

the Headkeeper may change the custom if he sees good reason for doing so. Both the Underkeepers are of course responsible to Mowat. Hitherto the Second keeper had the responsibility of the whole of the Ponies and the third keeper for the stable in the winter.

TRADESMEN.

Any Tradesmen that go up to Badanloch, Mowat will find them lodgings. These are usually shared with the second keeper, but not with the third keeper. All the keepers, however, are supposed to assist in this sort of thing, there is no much but the stipulation is that lodgings for tradesmen is not dontained in the third keeper's Agreement.

LODGE.

Any damage such as burst pipes, slates off &c., to be communicated direct to Mr Horne by Headkeeper. Mr Horne having built Badanloch and understands all about it, captain Wood wishes him specially to be invited by the Keeper of anything that may go wrong.

DOGS.

The Headkeeper is supposed to provide all dressings of a simple nature. But serious things and extra medicines including the services of the Vet: Surgeon will be chargeable against Captain Wood.

CROFTERS.

There are 3 old Crofters on the Shooting. Captain

Wood has been helping them and he wishes to continue to do
so on the old lines. The Gardener used to look after
them and see to their little requirements.

INVENTORY.

Captain Wood to send J.S. Inventory on his arrival in London. Particular items requiring checking will be crossed in blue pencil. Return Inventory when done with.

VERMINE.

Campbell's vermine to be checked carefully. It will chiefly consist of foxes.
